

ABOUT AEMS

Arizona Emergency Medical Systems, Inc. (AEMS), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, is a community-based volunteer organization dedicated to enhancing emergency medical services (EMS) and trauma care for the Central Arizona Region (which includes Maricopa, Gila, and Pinal counties). AEMS is enabled by and enabled by A.R.S 36-2210 to serve as the Regional Emergency Medical Services Coordinating System for the Central Arizona Region

Since 1975, AEMS has facilitated the collaboration of physicians, nurses, EMTs, paramedics, and hospital administrators to ensure that emergency medical care is delivered in a coordinated manner, and moreover, that it is meeting the needs of the public.

MISSION

AEMS shall facilitate continuous improvement of the diverse components of Emergency Medical Services for the Central Arizona Region, through an inclusive, collaborative, patient focused, and comprehensive approach, to meet the changing needs of the System and the community

SUPPORTING SERVICES

Management As a non-profit organization, AEMS is managed by an active, volunteer Board of Governors and Executive Committee. The AEMS Board is unique because it is composed of representatives from all levels of EMS and pre-hospital. Additionally, most of the individuals who serve on the Board are professionally impacted by AEMS' mission. The Executive Director is the only paid staff person who works in conjunction with the Board and Executive Committee to manage, coordinate, and implement the overall operations of the organization. To ensure organizational accountability, the AEMS Board of Governors, Executive Committee, and Executive Director frequently meet and communicate. During 2019-20, six Board meetings and six Executive Committee meetings were held.

Financial Accountability The AEMS Board of Governors is charged with ensuring that the financial resources of AEMS are properly and efficiently safeguarded, maintained, and used. The Board is also responsible for adopting management practices that foster and support the long-term sustainability of the organization.

To uphold the organization's financial health and integrity, a contracted bookkeeper conducts a monthly review and reconciliation of AEMS' finances. Additionally, an independent certified public accountant firm is annually retained to conduct a Financial Review or Audit.

Due to the pandemic, AEMS financial activity was significantly decreased during 2019-20. For this reason, the Board determined an extensive review of AEMS financials was not necessary and instead voted to conduct a Financial Compilation Report. Eckelberg and Wienshienk, PC, an independent certified public accounting firm, was hired to compile this report.

During September 2019, AEMS was audited by the Arizona Department of Economic Security to ensure that the organization was sufficiently paying worker's compensation. The audit indicated AEMS was compliant.

Volunteer Hours Through planning, coordinating, implementing, and participating in various AEMS activities, volunteers contributed a conservatively estimated **2195 hours** during 2019-20.

Garth Gemar, MD In December 2019, Dr. Gemar was elected the new Chair of AEMS. Since 1989, Dr. Gemar has been board certified in emergency medicine. Currently, Dr. Gemar works as the Chief Medical Officer of the Phoenix Fire Department. He is also the Medical Director for the Glendale Fire Department (since 2008) and Surprise Fire-Medical Department (since 2009). Dr. Gemar also once served as Medical Director with the Arizona Department of Health Services, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and Trauma System. He serves on numerous local, state, and regional EMS committees. AEMS is fortunate to be guided by Dr. Gemar's insight, experience, and knowledge. This past year he has proven to be a strong and effective leader by successfully helping AEMS continue its mission despite the challenges of the global pandemic.

PROGRAM AREAS OF FOCUS

EDUCATION

Education is one of the cornerstones of the organization. AEMS is a leader in producing and implementing quality education programs for EMS professionals that are knowledge, training, and prevention based. In addition to offering educational presentation during our Functional Group meetings, AEMS annually sponsors the EMS Odyssey Conference. AEMS is fortunate to receive support from healthcare professionals around the Central Region and statewide whom so generously share their time and expertise to expand the knowledge of our EMS professionals.

PLANNING, COMMUNITY OUTREACH, RESOURCE COORDINATION, AND ADVOCACY

Planning is an intrinsic part of AEMS' mission. It is a necessary tool to implement all of AEMS' activities from the Functional Group process to the Board level. Community Outreach & Resource Coordination, as the result of our collaboration and cooperation with the Central Arizona Region EMS and trauma care professionals, are a natural focus and outcome of AEMS' activities. Advocacy is crucial to the AEMS' mission as well as for its service to the State of Arizona. AEMS is charged with working together and advocating for the best practices of EMS and trauma care for the Central Arizona Region and statewide.

Regional Emergency Medical Services Coordinating System Central Regional EMS Council for the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS)

On behalf of the State of Arizona, AEMS serves as the Regional Emergency Medical Services Coordinating System for the Central Arizona Region. AEMS continues to have a productive and successful partnership with ADHS. AEMS maintains active representation on numerous state committees concerned with EMS, trauma, disaster preparedness, stroke, pediatric, community paramedicine, and other pertinent issues.



20th Annual EMS Odyssey Conference



Due to the global pandemic and social distancing requirements mandated by Arizona, it was necessary for AEMS to cancel the 20th Annual EMS Odyssey Conference. Months of conference planning were never brought to fruition thanks to Covid-19. While we continued to hold out hope that the virus would resolve itself in time for the June 2020 conference, we delayed canceling it until April. Once canceled, AEMS fully refunded all registrations received from participants and vendors. Additionally, due to Force Majeure, we sought and secured our deposit from the Desert Willow Conference Center.

Special thanks to the EMS Odyssey Conference Committee members and the Arizona Emergency Nurses Association for their time and assistance in planning this conference. Although we were unable to implement our efforts, we will carry forward our plans and apply them to next year's event.



Due to the global pandemic and social distancing requirements mandated by Arizona, it was necessary for AEMS to postpone the 19th Annual Aces of Hearts Awards. Although we received several nominations, it was important to the Board that the recipients of this award be provided an in-person tribute. Therefore, it was decided to indefinitely postpone the awards process and ceremony until the pandemic is safely resolved.

Functional Group Meetings

During 2019-20, AEMS coordinated six Functional Group meetings which averaged approximately 50 participants. The Functional Group meetings promoted education and resource sharing through presentations of Topical Focus (discussion of current issues), Agency/Hospital and Program Profiles (Central Arizona Region information sharing), and Lunch N Learn (knowledge-based learning).

RED Book (Regional EMS Directory)

The RED Book remains a valuable resource tool for field EMS and trauma personnel. As a “living document,” the RED Book requires frequent updates and changes. The RED Book Committee, which is composed AEMS constituents and incorporates the activities of the Valley Medical Directors, meets regularly to discuss current evidence-based science, and re-evaluate current protocols for practicality, effectiveness, and scientific recommendations.

RED Book activities during 2019-20 primarily involved the adoption and then education and training implementation of the Central Arizona Regional Guidelines. AEMS representatives, in collaboration with the Valley Medical Directors, EMS ROCC, and WEMSCOM, reviewed, discussed, and adapted the Triage, Treatment, and Transport guidelines (aka T3Gs) to create the Central Region EMS Guidelines. During December 2019, the Board approved the Central Arizona Regional Guidelines to replace the existing protocols found in RED Book, Chapter 3. The Central Regional Guidelines were officially published on AEMS website in January 2020. Franco Castro-Marin, MD produced several training videos for these guidelines that were published on AEMS website. A training by AEMS was planned and later implemented in September 2020.

Categorization

The activities of the Categorization Committee during 2019-20 included:

RED Book, Chapter 7, Categorization, including the questionnaire, was presented to the Board for a vote of approval in October 2019. Due to some questions concerning hospital staffing, the document was tabled for further review and discussion. Covid-19 further delayed the progress of the document. It is anticipated that the revisions will be approved by the Board in December 2020.

Tomi St. Mars was elected Chair of the Categorization Committee.

To prepare for the impact of the Covid-19 crisis and anticipated influx of patients, the AEMS Board of Governors approved the following emergency, temporary and provisional Categorization related measures:

- Emergency temporary categorization of Free-Standing emergency departments as presented.
- Emergency provisional categorization of the Phoenix VA Healthcare System as presented.
- Emergency temporary suspension of the categorization process as presented.

AEMS noted the following hospital changes.

- In 2019, Maricopa Integrated Health System changed its name to Valleywise Health. Maricopa Medical Center is now known Valleywise Health Medical Center. Maryvale Hospital is now known as Valleywise Emergency-Maryvale.
- In November 2019, after serving the Phoenix area for the past 100 years, St. Luke's Medical Center closed.

Covid-19 Provider Funding Distribution

In May 2020, AEMS and the other Regions were recipients of \$120,000 from the Arizona Department of Health Services, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and Trauma Systems. The purpose of this funding was to provide Covid-19 equipment and training support for Central Region fire departments/districts and other EMS provider agencies in need. Each Region was able to retain 10% to support administrative costs associated with the distribution of these funds.

To identify the funding recipients, AEMS created an equitable process where the most applicants possible would share some benefit from these funds. AEMS required all applicants to complete a mini need assessment followed by a funding application process. Applicants were then invited to a Priority Distribution meeting held via Zoom where their requests were vetted by all the participants. The list below provides the first round of funding - \$93,095.71 - distributed June 30, 2020. The \$14,905 in remaining funds was carried over to FY20-21 and required an additional application process.
