

FOREWORD

During 2020-21, the Covid-19 pandemic continued its relentless path of causing widespread illness and death. The byproducts of the virus, including social distancing, quarantines, and supply chain shortages, impacted all our lives and interactions.

As Covid-19 surged, so did the problems facing the Central Arizona EMS system and its professionals. Overwhelming patient counts led to full emergency rooms with limited or no beds. Hospital transfers, diverting of ambulance transports, and long ER wait times were commonplace. Staffing shortages, risk of exposure, and colleagues who became ill or died, only compounded the stress of being a healthcare professional. In February of 2021, a glimmer of hope and progress emerged with the vaccination rollout. While not a panacea, the vaccines have proven to reduce the risk of contracting or becoming serious ill from Covid-19.

As an organization, AEMS operations continued to be disrupted by and beholden to the spread of Covid-19. We elected to continue to restrict our in-person activities since the Arizona's declared Public Health State of Emergency remains in effect. Moreover, we remain concerned for the safety and care of our EMS professionals and community.

Despite the challenges and adversity caused by the pandemic, AEMS continues to play an important role in bringing together the EMS community to address challenges and enhance patient care. Our monthly virtual meetings continued to promote advocacy, collaboration, and cooperation on the pertinent issues impacting the EMS system. While our education events, including presentations during Functional Group meetings, the EMS CE Fall Forum, and the EMS Odyssey, continued to promote EMS learning, training, and awareness of topical healthcare subjects by esteemed experts.

ABOUT AEMS

Arizona Emergency Medical Systems, Inc. (AEMS), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, is a community-based volunteer organization dedicated to enhancing emergency medical services (EMS) and trauma care for the Central Arizona Region (which includes Maricopa, Gila, and Pinal counties). AEMS is enabled by and enabled by A.R.S 36-2210 to serve as the Regional Emergency Medical Services Coordinating System for the Central Arizona Region

Since 1975, AEMS has facilitated the collaboration of physicians, nurses, EMTs, paramedics, and hospital administrators to ensure that emergency medical care is delivered in a coordinated manner, and moreover, that it is meeting the needs of the public.

MISSION

AEMS shall facilitate continuous improvement of the diverse components of Emergency Medical Services for the Central Arizona Region, through an inclusive, collaborative, patient focused, and comprehensive approach, to meet the changing needs of the System and the community

SUPPORTING SERVICES

Management As a non-profit organization, AEMS is managed by an active, volunteer Board of Governors and Executive Committee. The AEMS Board is unique because it is composed of representatives from all levels of EMS and pre-hospital. Additionally, most individuals who serve on the Board are professionally impacted by AEMS' mission. The Executive Director is the only paid staff person who works in conjunction with the Board and Executive Committee to manage, coordinate, and implement the overall operations of the organization. To ensure organizational accountability, the AEMS Board of Governors, Executive Committee, and Executive Director frequently meet and communicate. During 2020-21, six Board meetings and six Executive Committee meetings were held.

Financial Accountability The AEMS Board of Governors is charged with ensuring that the financial resources of AEMS are properly and efficiently safeguarded, maintained, and used. The Board is also responsible for adopting management practices that foster and support the long-term sustainability of the organization.

To uphold the organization's financial health and integrity, a contracted bookkeeper conducts a monthly review and reconciliation of AEMS' finances. Additionally, an independent certified public accountant firm is annually retained to conduct a Financial Review or Audit.

Although the pandemic continued to impact AEMS' activities, the Board determined that it was in the best interest of financial stewardship, to conduct a Financial Review of the 2020-21 finances. Eckelberg and Wienshienk, PC, an independent certified public accounting firm, was hired to conduct the Financial Review.

COMMUNITY INTERACTION



In early 2020, after the pandemic emerged and the State Public Health Emergency was declared, it was necessary for AEMS to identify an online format so that we could continue to conduct meetings and interact with our members, volunteers, and other constituents. AEMS successfully transitioned the Board, Executive Committee, and Functional Group meetings to the ZOOM online platform. Additionally, we held our first education event, the EMS CE Fall Forum on December 3, 2020, on Zoom with enormous success. In fact, we regarded the EMS CE Fall Forum virtual experience as our test pilot for the EMS Odyssey, which was held on June 9, 2021, via Zoom. We continue to find AEMS' online presence as a functional and efficient way to maintain our community meeting structure and interaction, while increasing our participation, particularly from our rural providers.

EDUCATION

Education is a cornerstone of the organization. AEMS is a leader in producing and implementing quality education programs for EMS professionals that are knowledge, training, and prevention based and presented by esteemed experts in the field. This year we were fortunate to have collaborated with the Arizona State Fire School to coordinate the EMS CE Fall Forum. We also continued our collaboration with the Arizona Emergency Nurses Association in our coordination of the 21st Annual EMS Odyssey Conference. As part of our Functional Group meetings, we reserved time for various educational presentations. AEMS is grateful for the generous support we receive from healthcare professionals around the Central Region and statewide whom share their time and expertise to help us expand the knowledge of our EMS professionals.

PLANNING, COMMUNITY OUTREACH, RESOURCE COORDINATION, AND ADVOCACY

Planning is an intrinsic part of AEMS' mission. It is a necessary tool to implement all of AEMS' activities from the Functional Group process to the Board level. Community Outreach & Resource Coordination, as the result of our collaboration and cooperation with the Central Arizona Region EMS and trauma care professionals, are a natural focus and outcome of AEMS' activities. Advocacy is crucial to the AEMS' mission as well as for its service to the State of Arizona. AEMS is charged with working together and advocating for the best practices of EMS and trauma care for the Central Arizona Region and statewide.

ACTIVITIES

1st Annual EMS CE Fall Forum

December 3, 2020 - Zoom



In collaboration with the Arizona State Fire School, AEMS coordinated and implemented the EMS CE Fall Forum on December 3, 2020, via the Zoom platform.

This all-day educational event was held via Zoom and featured presentations including:

- Psychological First Aid
- Medical Legal Considerations
- Pediatric Seizures and Prehospital Management
- Arizona First Responders Initiative Update
- Covid 19 Lessons Learned
- Bites and Stings in Arizona

This event was a momentous success with over 200 registered participants. 5.5 CEs were awarded to participants who attended all the sessions. A total of 194 CE Certificates were issued.

21st Annual EMS Odyssey Conference

June 9, 2021 - Zoom



AEMS continued its successful partnership with Arizona Emergency Nurses Association to collaborate and coordinate this year's Odyssey.

Special thanks to the EMS Odyssey Conference Committee members and the Arizona Emergency Nurses Association for their time and assistance in planning this outstanding conference.

Due to the pandemic and its continued surges, it was necessary to host the 21st Annual EMS Odyssey Conference as a virtual event using the Zoom platform.

A total of 240 participants registered. Of the registered participants, a total of 156 CE Certificates were issued (99/EMCTs and 57/RNs).

Regional Emergency Medical Services Coordinating System Central Regional EMS Council for the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS)

On behalf of the State of Arizona, AEMS serves as the Regional Emergency Medical Services Coordinating System for the Central Arizona Region. AEMS continues to have a productive and successful partnership with ADHS. AEMS maintains active representation on various state committees concerned with EMS, trauma, medical direction, disaster preparedness, stroke, education, pediatric, community paramedicine, and other pertinent issues.

RED Book (Regional EMS Directory)

The RED Book remains a valuable resource tool for field EMS and trauma personnel. As a “living document,” the RED Book requires frequent updates and changes. The RED Book Committee, which is composed AEMS constituents and incorporates the activities of the Valley Medical Directors, meets regularly to discuss current evidence-based science, and re-evaluate current protocols for practicality, effectiveness, and scientific recommendations.

During 2020-21, the Red Book Committee began the time and labor-intensive task of making the Red Book a more contemporary, adaptable, concise, and relevant document. Several chapters were deleted, modified, and renumbered. The constant theme the Committee followed was: “What can AEMS do, as codified by the Red Book, that no other entity can accomplish.” To make this happen, we believed the Red Book needed to be extremely easy to use on-line, easily changed in response to System needs, and be heavy on resources and useful information. The Red Book should augment our website presence.

Moving forward, the AEMS Executive Committee will look to the Board of Governors and other volunteers during the coming year for assistance in finalizing the amendments in progress and continually re-evaluating the product. It is anticipated that this will be an easier process moving forward since the result of all the work will be a much more streamlined document.

Categorization

Categorization is a voluntary process of assessing and categorizing the relative preparedness and capabilities of hospitals (or other healthcare facilities, such as satellite emergency centers), their emergency departments and their medical staffs, to provide emergency medical care and associated healthcare services to patients with several types of medical and surgical emergencies.

During 2020-21, the Categorization Committee's work was constant. The COVID-19 pandemic has done nothing but increase the Committee's work. In addition, a trend toward "micro-hospitals" and Free Standing EDs (FSEDs), also known as Satellite Emergency Centers, has caused the Committee to add new sections under which facilities may Categorize.

The Committee is in the process of developing a new Categorization Matrix. The early terminology for the available categories under which a facility can apply to receive 911 generated EMS ambulance traffic are:

1. General full-service hospitals (further triage determined by specialty care needs of patient).
2. "Micro-hospitals" (generally 20 beds or less, limited if any ICU or specialty service line care options).
3. FSEDs. Generally, no inpatient capabilities, therefore patients that in the estimation of EMS may need to be admitted should (likely) be triaged to other facilities via local guidelines.
4. Critical Access Hospitals are in existence in the AEMS region. Therefore, a section, in development, will be dedicated to them.

During the previous Fiscal Year, to prepare for the impact of the Covid-19 crisis and anticipated influx of patients, the AEMS Board of Governors approved the following emergency, temporary and provisional Categorization related measures which continue to remain active:

- Emergency temporary categorization of Free-Standing emergency departments as presented.
- Emergency provisional categorization of the Phoenix VA Healthcare System as presented.
- Emergency temporary suspension of the categorization process as presented.

The Dignity Arizona General network of FSEDs received "Emergency Temporary Categorization" in early 2020, after the gubernatorial proclaimed COVID-19 state of emergency declaration went into effect, and that order has not been rescinded. Hence, they remain Categorized.

Facilities Categorized during 2020-21, include:

1. Banner Ocotillo
2. HonorHealth Sonoran Crossing (taking the place of HonorHealth Sonoran FSED)
3. Abrazo Cave Creek (micro-hospital)
4. Abrazo Surprise (micro-hospital)
5. HonorHealth Scottsdale Thompson Peak Medical Center - Primary Stroke Center

Facilities with Categorization questionnaires pending and still under review by June 30, 2021, include:

1. Exceptional Healthcare Community Hospital, Maricopa (under FSED criteria).
It should be noted that at the time of this document's publication (December 2021), the Exceptional Healthcare Community Hospital, Maricopa was officially categorized.

The Categorizations provided during 2021 that correlate with the noted hospital changes for the year, include:

- HonorHealth Sonoran Crossing Medical Center opened in September 2020.
- Abrazo Surprise Hospital opened in October 2020
- Banner Ocotillo opened in November 2020
- HonorHealth Scottsdale Thompson Peak Medical Center became a Primary Stroke Center March 2021

Covid-19 Provider Funding Distribution

In May 2020, AEMS and the other Regions were recipients of \$120,000 from the Arizona Department of Health Services, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and Trauma Systems. The purpose of this funding was to provide Covid-19 equipment and training support for Central Region fire departments/districts and other EMS provider agencies in need. Each Region was able to retain 10% to support administrative costs associated with the distribution of these funds.

AEMS received and successfully distributed \$108,000 in special Covid-19 Pandemic funds to EMS providers throughout our region. The first round of funding (\$93,095.71) was distributed in June 2020. The remaining funding (\$14,905) was distributed in August 2021.

To identify the funding recipients, AEMS created an equitable process where the most applicants possible would share benefit from these funds. AEMS required all applicants to complete a mini need assessment followed by a funding application process. Applicants were then invited to a Priority Distribution meeting held via Zoom where all participants vetted their requests. The list below provides the second round of funding - \$14,905.00 - distributed in August 2021.
